Reference Citation in Assignments and Papers

When you refer in your text to information drawn from another source, use within the text the standard format for citation:

Author's last name (year:pages)
E.g. Gleitman & Newport (1984)
Gleitman et al. (1977:1-2)

Source pages as above are useful but optional.

If you use readings I assigned/mentioned in the syllabus, this should be enough. For other relevant readings, add the complete reference at the end of your answer, in a separate list, in the formats below.

For books use this format:

Author's last name, Author first name or initial. (ed. – for editors of collections of papers). Year. Title. Place of publication: Publisher, Pages.

E.g.
Chomsky, N. 1986. *Knowledge of Language*. New York: Praeger, 1-20.

Gleitman L. R. & M. Liberman, eds. 1995a. *Language: An Invitation to Cognitive Science, Second Edition. Vol. 1*. Cambridge, MA: MIT Press.

For book chapters use this format:

Gleitman, Lila R. and Elissa L. Newport The Invention of Language by Children: Environmental and Biological Influences on the Acquisition of Language. In *An Invitation to Cognitive Science: Volume 1: Language*, ed. Lila R. Gleitman & Mark Liberman. Cambridge, Mass. MIT Press, 1995, 1-24.

For Journal Papers use this format:

Martin, R. 2001. Null Case and the distribution of PRO. *Linguistic Inquiry* 32:141-66.
